Daily Bible Readings for Home Devotions; Oct. 18-23, '21

Mon Amos 5:10-15 has the most intense admonition to be found anywhere in the Bible. Now, who should seek the LORD and live? People sliding into immoral muck and religious heresy, whose personal and national values were spiraling down into a black hole (10-13). To them Amos made this urgent appeal: seek good and not evil, that you may live; it may be that the LORD God of hosts will be gracious to the remnant who return to God not just in theory but in genuine, unconditioned repentance. It can happen.


Tues Mark 10:17-27 The wealthy fellow arrived cheerfully but departed disheartened. He seemed eager for more homework, for he was faithful in his daily duties, but Jesus' new assignment was very challenging. Now then, since graduation (to heaven) was still out of his reach, Jesus in compassion prescribed a task that would open his eyes. Was the fellow dedicated enough to accept and fulfill the tough assignment? For him, it was impossible, but God is still able to save those who are unable.

Wed Hebrews 3:1-6 Jesus never fudged on His assignment but was flawless. Since He never cut corners, He is 100% dependable, and as long as we hold fast to Him, we enjoy His accomplishment firm to the end. Our High Priest was faithful to His Father's assignment, which puts even Moses in the shade. Jesus is superior by reason of being the Son, having jurisdiction over God's family circle, including you and me. Jesus has made it happen.

Thurs Psalm 90 Moses, trusty servant in God's household, praises God for His time<u>less</u>ness (1-2), in contrast to the time<u>liness</u> of human life (3-6). As for ourselves, *all our days have passed away in God's wrath*—whether 70, 80, or more years—it is soon cut off, and we fly away. That's why we plead with God to have compassion on us and allow us to get the big picture—the beauty of the LORD our God. The work of our hands follows.

Fri Mark 10:23-25 Are kingdom of heaven and kingdom of God identical? Right after Jesus dealt with the rich fellow who wanted to enter eternal life, He laid it out to His disciples, using the term kingdom of God (three times). Actually, being subject to God's dominion while living on Earth is necessary and proper prelude to living in the kingdom of God in heaven. God's kingdom has one foot on Earth and the other in Heaven.

Sat Hebrews 3:7-4:9 presents the fatal consequences of being a disbeliever of God's promises—to jolt us out of any complacency about the inheritance God has waiting for us. God has promised eternal *rest* to those who seek it via Jesus, and His invitation is still on-line. So, let's take the warning to heart and also trust God to have a *rest*ing place reserved for us. See you there.



Ps. 90:12-17

¹² So teach us to number our days that we may get a heart of wisdom. ¹³ Return, O LORD! How long? Have pity on your servants! ¹⁴ Satisfy us in the morning with your steadfast love, that we may rejoice and be glad all our days. ¹⁵ Make us glad for as many days as you have afflicted us, and for as many years as we have seen evil. ¹⁶ Let your work be shown to your servants, and your glorious power to their children. ¹⁷ Let the favor of the Lord our God be upon us, and establish the work of our hands upon us; yes, establish the work of our hands!

What do you need?

Would the list fill a page or more? Would it read something like this: I need vacation time, a fatter paycheck, new clothes for fall, a better car, less debt, a bigger house, fun things to do, etc.? If we have all these unfulfilled "needs," what does that say about God? The implication would be that God is pretty stingy when it comes to His care for us. He is the creator and owner of all things. He Himself needs nothing. "For every animal of the forest is mine, and the cattle on a thousand hills" (Ps. 50:10). So then why would He withhold all these things which we "need"?

The truth is that God is not at all stingy. His love and generosity are limitless. But it's also true that we often confuse "wants" with "needs." Needs are things essential to life and wellbeing. We need air, food, and water to survive. Wants are desires that we have. You may want a Starbucks pumpkin spice chai latte this morning, but it's hardly a need.

The Lord is generous and loving. He says, "Ask and it will be given to you." He promises to provide for all our needs in the very best way. Our greatest need by far is to have guilt wiped off our record so that we can be at peace with God and be heirs of heaven. God freely forgives us in Christ. "Though your sins are like scarlet, they shall be as white as snow; though they are red as crimson, they shall be like wool" (Is. 1:18).

At the same time, we have physical, earthly needs. Jesus teaches us to pray, "Give us this day our daily bread." God who feeds the sparrows promises to give His children their daily necessities. We don't have to feel deprived. Paul writes, "Godliness with contentment is great gain...But if we have food and clothing, we will be content with that" (1 Tim. 6:6).

God is not stingy. He provides for all our needs and gives us so much more. But He doesn't always give us everything we want. That's a good thing. Sometimes we want things which would be harmful, rather than beneficial. In a child's eyes a triple scoop of chocolate ice cream may seem like the best thing in the world at the moment, but Mom and Dad may decide otherwise. Solomon wisely prayed, "Give me neither poverty nor riches, but give me only my daily bread. Otherwise, I may have too much and disown you...Or I may become poor and steal, and so dishonor the name of my God" (Prov. 30:8-9). Trust that along with what God has given you, His withholding of other things is evidence of His goodness.

What do we truly need? Look around. The Lord has supplied it all. Our forgiveness and salvation are sure in Christ. The Lord who fed 5,000 men with only a handful of bread and fish generously gives us our daily bread too. If anything is missing, He says, "Ask, and it will be given to you."

OLD TESTAMENT READING – Amos 5:6, 7, 10-15 "For Seek the LORD and live, lest he break out like fire in the house of Joseph, and it devour, with none to quench it for Bethel, ⁷ O you who turn justice to wormwood and cast down righteousness to the earth! ¹⁰ They hate him who reproves in the gate, and they abhor him who speaks the truth. ¹¹ Therefore because you trample on the poor and you exact taxes of grain from him, you have built houses of hewn stone, but you shall not dwell in them; you have planted pleasant

vineyards, but you shall not drink their wine. ¹² For I know how many are your transgressions and how great are your sins-- you who afflict the righteous, who take a bribe, and turn aside the needy in the gate. ¹³ Therefore he who is prudent will keep silent in such a time, for it is an evil time. ¹⁴ Seek good, and not evil, that you may live; and so the LORD, the God of hosts, will be with you, as you have said. ¹⁵ Hate evil, and love good, and establish justice in the gate; it may be that the LORD, the God of hosts, will be gracious to the remnant of Joseph.

EPISTLE READING – **Hebrews 3:1-6** Therefore, holy brothers, you who share in a heavenly calling, consider Jesus, the apostle and high priest of our confession, ² who was faithful to him who appointed him, just as Moses also was faithful in all God's house. ³ For Jesus has been counted worthy of more glory than Moses-- as much more glory as the builder of a house has more honor than the house itself. ⁴ (For every house is built by someone, but the builder of all things is God.) ⁵ Now Moses was faithful in all God's house as a servant, to testify to the things that were to be spoken later, ⁶ but Christ is faithful over God's house as a son. And we are his house, if indeed we hold fast our confidence and our boasting in our hope.

SERMON – Mark 10:17-27 And as he was setting out on his journey, a man ran up and knelt before him and asked him, "Good Teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?" ¹⁸ And Jesus said to him, "Why do you call me good? No one is good except God alone. ¹⁹ You know the commandments: 'Do not murder, Do not commit adultery, Do not steal, Do not bear false witness, Do not defraud, Honor your father and mother." ²⁰ And he said to him, "Teacher, all these I have kept from my youth." ²¹ And Jesus, looking at him, loved him, and said to him, "You lack one thing: go, sell all that you

have and give to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; and come, follow me." ²² Disheartened by the saying, he went away sorrowful, for he



had great possessions. ²³ And Jesus looked around and said to his disciples, "How difficult it will be for those who have wealth to enter the kingdom of God!" ²⁴ And the disciples were amazed at his words. But Jesus said to them again, "Children, how difficult it is to enter the kingdom of God! ²⁵ It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for a rich person to enter the kingdom of God." ²⁶ And they were exceedingly astonished, and said to him, "Then who can be saved?" ²⁷ Jesus looked at them and said, "With man it is impossible, but not with God. For all things are possible with God."
